Funded through Advanced Education, Skills & Labour (AESL), we provide career and employment services to individuals living in our 5 member centre neighbourhoods. Through Building Employment Opportunities, we provide programs as well as individual and group services that help individuals through their employment journey. We provide many different levels of supports that help individuals build confidence, enhance their skills and obtain sustainable employment.

Fry Family Foundation SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM



For the past 13 years, CCA has had a very successful partnership with the Fry Family Foundation. This partnership supports individuals to reach their educational goals through The Fry Family Foundation Scholarship Program. An important element of the scholarship program is its emphasis beyond just academic performance; it focuses as well on the individual's community involvement as a leader, mentor or volunteer. The scholarship program has been and continues to be a vital support for many individuals from our neighbourhoods; helping individuals access post-secondary education opportunities which otherwise would often be inaccessible.

Youth Achieve!

LITERACY PROGRAM



The Youth Achieve! Literacy Program provides basic literacy skills development to youth ages 11 – 17 that are still attached to the school system but have very low literacy skills. This project is an attempt to prevent youth who are struggling in school from dropping out. Funding for this project came from the Department of Career, Employment and Youth Services within Advanced Education Skills & Labour (AESL) as well as our annual CCA/PGI Run/Walk for Literacy.

We continue to see the need and validity of this program, and are reaching students when they are younger, more eager to learn, and in a stage where it is easier to help them meet their own grade level.


Value of Work VALUE OF MONEY



Funded by Advanced Education, Skills & Labour, Value of Work, Value of Money focuses on youth who are at risk of becoming second generation income support recipients. Over 8 weeks, 10 school-aged youth have paid summer employment and a volunteer experience, along with training sessions. All with a goal of supporting youth to understand how to take ownership of their future through planning their education goals and focusing on their financial well-being. Often the program provides youth with their first work experience, which involves working a maximum of 30 hours per week at one of our member community centres. Each youth also receive 40 hours of training workshops/ seminars and 30 volunteer hours to provide a holistic framework of support.

Homework HAVEN



Homework Haven is funded by Advanced Education, Skills & Labour through its Division of Career, Employment and Youth Services. This program is an early intervention strategy which helps provide a safe and reliable homework support network right in each of the five community centres. Homework Haven provides Grade 7-12 students from our five neighbourhoods with afterschool homework support. This support not only helps students with their homework assignments and projects, it encourages learning and helps highlight the importance of staying in school. In the program, students can borrow school books, get personal one-on-one help with homework activities, and use computers. Homework Haven also allows for the older students to assist the younger ones which increases their confidence and self-esteem. In return, the younger students get to experience social inclusion and mentorship. A majority of the students are consistent participants week after week and year after year. This clearly identifies the success of the program and the level of its importance to the students.

Community Centre Alliance LINKAGES PROGRAM



The Linkages Program is funded by the Department of Advanced Education, Skills & Labour. It supports the development of employability & career skills for youth ages 18-30 years who are non-EI eligible and have a minimum Level II high school education. Over 26 weeks, Linkages participants gain insight into the world of work and potential career paths.

Linkages 2017-2018 was the 16th program delivered by CCA. All 6 participants were successful in completing the program.

Once a month, participants attended professional and personal development sessions. And, the remainder of the month was spent working in a job placement that (where possible) related to the participant's career goal. A special thank you to the employers who provided these valuable work placements.

RUN/ WALK FOR LITERACY

In 2012, the CCA began a Run/ Walk for Literacy as a way to support the delivery of a literacy program for youth. CCA and its member centres long recognized the impact literacy has on an individual's success throughout their life and saw the vital need to help youth enhance their literacy skills. The proceeds of the Run/ Walk for Literacy directly support CCA's Youth Achieve! Literacy Program which focuses on doing just that. Youth Achieve! helps ensure youth can graduate high school and then successfully continue on into post-secondary training and employment.

In 2016, CCA began to partner with the Peter Gzowski Invitational (PGI) on the Run/ Walk to grow the support for literacy programming. The PGI was established in 1986 by award-winning Canadian broadcaster and journalist Peter Gzowski. Peter began raising funds for literacy through an annual golf tournament. Today a variety of PGI events are held across Canada in all provinces and the territories with more than \$13.9 million raised since the PGI began in 1986. These funds directly support literacy initiatives in the provinces and territories where the PGIs are held. We are grateful to have the PGI - Newfoundland and Labrador partner to support our Youth Achieve! Literacy Program.
